	Transparency
	What does transparency mean to your family?When is transparency appropriate (versus privacy)?
	Security
	 What does a secure family environment look like to you? How do you value the various types of security: Physical Financial Emotional
	Tradition
	What are your core family traditions? Who is included?Do you form new traditions easily?
